Etoie dealt with Harold's absence by preparing for her profession as a beautician at Stephens Beauty Academy in Montgomery, eventually opening The Smart Beauty Shop, Kellyton's first. It was here that Etoie operated not only the first but the best Beauty Shop in the area AND the first real concentration of news. How could she help but report some of it?

On completing his military duty, Harold resumed his education including a business course at Reynolds Business College in Sylacauga.

With these preliminaries taken care of, Harold and Etoie led very involved lives in their work, family, civic and church involvement.

Home has been a very important aspect with its upkeep and enhancement includ-

Community involvement included PTA, Home Demonstration Club and any activities in which their children took part. Claude Ollius Vardaman

He liked Ike, loved Sue, and worshipped the Lord

Thus begins a fitting Tribute to Claude Ollius Vardaman by the First Methodist Church of Birmingham, Alabama, where he was a member for 66 years until his death, March 20, 1992.

Claude, longtime chairman of the Alabama State Republican Party, a position he first ascended to in 1942 after serving six years as Young Republican Chairman, was instrumental in convincing General Dwight D. "Ike" Eisenhower to run for the Presidency in 1952. In 1951 he journeyed to Paris, France, to urge General Eisenhower, then retiring as Supreme Commander of the Allied Expeditionary Forces in Europe (SHAFE), to permit his name to be submitted to the Republican National Convention as a candidate
